From the Pastor...

Exciting plans are underway as we prepare for our 275th Anniversary celebrations! The Anniversary Task Force has met again. It includes Joanne Hughes, Ginny Swanagan, Audrey Smith, Dorothy Klotzbeacher, Carlene Reyes, Pastor Rosanna, and me. Here are some things that are in the works or have happened recently.

- Minutes for History: There have been several already (see below); one was celebrating the 25th anniversary of CPNS, another related to the preservation of our church's historical documents and records, and an additional one concerned the Fall Adult Sunday School class on Jonathan Edwards taking David Brainerd's advice in his last letter to his brother John in Cranbury to "read Mr. Edwards..." Another Minute for History is planned for September 20 to introduce the sale of the historic nails from the old church chancel floor to fund a catered luncheon on November 1. We also hope to have Minutes for History highlighting an historic timeline of our church's history and perhaps some important ministries like Skeet's Food Pantry.
- Special 275th anniversary bulletin covers will be in use beginning in September.
- The Cranbury House Tour will be on October 17. Don Klotzbeacher will perform a harpsichord concert after the tour ends. The tour is over at 4:00 p.m.; the concert will begin at 4:30 p.m.
- Fall Adult Sunday School class on Jonathan Edwards taking David Brainerd's advice in his last letter to his brother John in Cranbury to "read Mr. Edwards..."
- There will be two special worship services. This is a change from our last report. One service will indeed be on Reformation Sunday, October 25. On that day, we will recognize and honor our 50+ Year Members. Session has granted permission to celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on that important day as well as on November 1. On October 25, Reformation Sunday, we will use a communion liturgy based on John Calvin and the Reformed tradition.
- Sunday, November 1 will be the climactic worship service. It is All Saints' Day and a fitting time for an historical celebration. Don Klotzbeacher is writing a special anthem for our Chorale, bells and brass. We will also sing a hymn he composed for our 250th anniversary. As per tradition, the communion service will note those from our church family who have died during this past year. The catered luncheon following worship will take place on November 1. This is a change from our last report. At the luncheon, there will be a special presentation on David Brainerd.
- Possible CD to sell of highlights from church ensembles.
- A number of 10 year anniversaries: Janice Parker as Director of CPNS; Sharon Ramkishun as office staff, now Office Manager; Len Swec leading the Men's Fellowship; and my being your pastor.

"...there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it" (1 Corinthians 12:25-27).

We hope everyone had time to relax and enjoy the summer. We have been busy working on plans and curriculum as well as getting everything ready for a new school year. We are all looking forward to filling our classrooms and hallways with the sight and sounds of children and their families.

As you walk through the halls of CPNS you will see the same familiar faces caring for our children. We are happy to say everyone is returning from last year. CPNS continues to be blessed with a teaching staff that share their Christian values and love each child unconditionally and with respect.

We continue to be faced with challenges to provide our children and their families with all they need while maintaining an appropriate academic preschool. God always has a plan and things always seem to fit into place here at CPNS. This summer we achieved our NAEYC Accreditation that we have been working on for the last several years. Please read more about this outstanding achievement following this article.

Our Parent Information Sessions will be on Thursday, September 10. This evening will give parents an opportunity to review school policy and give them all the necessary information about our CPNS programs. Parents will also have the opportunity to meet with their child's teachers in the classrooms. Our Open House is Friday, September 11, which gives the children an opportunity to meet their teachers and their new friends. Monday, September 14 we will begin our regular scheduled school year.

Our Getting to Know You Day introduces the children to all of the teachers in our school and the music program. We also have a parent social that day for the parents to get to know each other as well. Please stop by for light refreshments and meet our parents at 11:00 and 2:30 on September 29 and 30 in the McKnight Room.

We continue to review our curriculum and look for new resources so our children are provided with the most developmentally appropriate academic preschool program. We will continue to use a developmental continuum assessment for all our children so we can meet them at their level, and provide them with the tools to continue to their next level. We will also continue to use the Kindergarten Assessment Criteria with all of our 4/5-year old children, giving parents all the information they need to ensure their child will be ready for Kindergarten.

Our enrichment programs this year will include Art & Literacy, Music & Movement, Science and Math as well as a new one The Power of Play. We also are providing our lunch program 5 days a week.

If you are interested or if you know of anyone who may be interested in our preschool program we have just a few openings in our 3 and 4/5-year old programs for the school year 2009-2010 beginning in September. Over the last several years our CPNS staff has had the opportunity of working towards a National accreditation from NAEYC, the nation's leading organization of early childhood professionals. We have worked hard putting together classroom and program portfolios as well as enhancing our classroom environments to provide all children and their families with the most appropriate preschool program for each and every child.

In order to financially support this process we obtained a grant from Catholic Charities in the amount of \$1,500.00 which defrayed most of the associated expenses. They also provided support and guidance each step of the way.

We are so proud to have earned this mark of quality from NAEYC, and to be recognized for our commitment to reaching the highest professional standards. NAEYC Accreditation lets families in our community know that children in our program are getting the best care and early learning experiences possible.

To earn NAEYC Accreditation we went through an extensive Self-Study process, measuring the program and its services against the 10 NAEYC Early Childhood Program Standards and more than 400 related Accreditation Criteria. We received NAEYC Accreditation after a site visit by NAEYC Assessors to ensure that we meet each of the ten program standards. We not only met each one achieving 90% or more, in 5 categories we achieved 100+%.

In the 23 years since NAEYC Accreditation was established it has become a widely recognized sign of high-quality early childhood education. Approximately 8 percent of all preschools and other early childhood programs have achieved NAEYC Accreditation. Our NAEYC Accreditation is a sign that we are a leader in a national effort to invest in high-quality early childhood education, and we will help give all children the best foundation for their academic success that we possibly can.

The NAEYC Accreditation system has set professional standards for programs for young children since 1985. In September 2006, the Association revised program standards and criteria to introduce a new level of quality, accountability, and service for parents and children. Women and girls are very oppressed in the Congo. Women’s lives are commonly controlled by men and sexual and domestic violence are commonplace. When sexual violence outside of marriage results in pregnancy, the girl is often accused of improper behavior and rejected by her family and community. She and her baby are often without hope.

In 2007 a kind Presbyterian provided enough funding to begin a school teaching these young women sewing and business. The Single Mom’s Sewing School opened in December, 2007, and

graduated 19 a year later. At graduation each young woman was provided a sewing machine and kit of supplies to start her own business. All are doing well, making enough to buy food, provide health care, purchase and raise chickens and goats, and in typical Congolese style help pay school fees for their siblings. Four joined together to start a "boutique" in Kananga, a larger town.

Today these young mothers live lives transformed from shame, despair and rejection to dignity and respect, knowing that they are loved by God and so many in the Presbyterian Church.

Thirty new students will graduate in February 2010. Thanks be to God!

The **Cranbury Historical & Preservation Society** is interested in rebuilding the Parsonage Barn c.1770 that was once a part of the Parsonage Plantation of the First Presbyterian Church of Cranbury. The Parsonage Plantation of 150 acres was secured by a deed in 1759 and adjoined the earlier church property. In 2005, the timbers of this historic barn were dismantled and were put in storage with the NJ Barn Company. Society preservation funds and grant funds will fund most of the project of rebuilding the barn on Cranbury Neck Road near South Main Street where two other historic barns now stand. If you are interested in seeing the Parsonage Plantation barn rebuilt in Cranbury, please attend the Cranbury Township Committee meeting in Town Hall on **Monday, August 24 at 7 PM.**

PRESBYTERY HAPPENINGS

June 23, 2009 Meeting

For almost thirty years, our writer of distinction, Gretchen Stults, has served as our designated elder commissioner from Cranbury First Presbyterian Church to Monmouth Presbytery. Many of you may have regularly read this column, "Presbytery Gleanings." During the past four years, I have on a rotational basis with other Session members served as the alternate or second elder commissioner. Gretchen has made the decision to step down. Session named me to be the new designated elder commissioner. The seconded elder commissioner, as in the past, will be an elder member from Session serving on a rotational basis.

For the benefit of new Presbyterian members in our congregation who may wonder what are the Presbytery, the Synod and the General Assembly, I will attempt to explain each of their basic functions in future newsletters, one issue at a time. To begin, Ministers of the Word and Sacrament (our pastors), are not members of the congregation that they serve. Actually they are elected by the congregations, approved, ordained and installed by the presbytery and are members of the presbytery.

At the June 23 meeting of Presbytery at Forked River Presbyterian Church, our pastors were not able to be there. So I was the solo commissioner from Cranbury. They were lucky, as I did not get back home until after midnight- a long meeting, indeed! At the previous Presbytery meeting, it was a "meeting of discernment." Two of the items they had discussed we tried out at this meeting and were successfully accomplished. We began with registration and light snacks in their fellowship hall. From there we moved into the sanctuary for worship. The Rev. Dr. Terry Chapman, pastor at Forked River, delivered the sermon. Terry and I share one thing in common: we both came from San Gabriel Presbytery in Southern California, where I served as the presbytery moderator during 1998. Following worship we all returned to fellowship hall where the actual meeting was held. Normally everything with the exception of registration is conducted in the host church's sanctuary. We sat around tables. Some of us actually had our backs to the pulpit and lectern- really informal- and many continued to enjoy the snack foods during the meeting. The first hour of was a real Donnie Brook- I actually thought about heading home. We were stuck on a motion concerning balance of elders and clergy. According to the Presbyterian Church (USA) *Book of Order*, presbyteries are to be staffed by an equal number of elder commissioners and minister members. Elder presbyters who serve as presbytery committee chairs, moderator, vice moderator, stated clerk or treasurer are also members of presbytery during their terms in office. Rev David and Mrs. McKirachan immediately jumped to their feet and as a way of calming presbytery and invited all presbytery commissioners to their home in Shrewsbury on October 24 to enjoy a back yard party. After this first hour, all returned to being civil and respectable Christians once again. What a joy!

The Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM) introduced Inquirer Chris Terry Nelson and recommended that he be raised

to candidacy status on his journey to becoming a minister of the word and sacrament. The presbytery approved the motion. Gretchen Stults serves on CPM. The Hunger Action group spoke briefly on the "Cents-Ability Program." This is in lieu of an upfront donation by placing two cents each meal for a year in a piggy bank and bringing the full bank to a presbytery meeting for distribution to the needy. The Nominating Committee presented their slate of new candidates that included Dr. Mitchell to the Permanent Judicial Commission, class of 15-1, Gretchen Stults to CPM for class of 12-1. All on the slate were duly elected. Beverly Gilbert has been serving on the PJC in the class of 2011. Ken Gordon has been serving on the Sessional Records Committee class of 11-1 and this year he is the chair. I have been serving on the Committee on Ministry (COM) class 11-1. I chair the COM Task Force on Comprehensive Protection Policies. The Task Force is writing Risk Management Policies for the presbytery. I also serve four congregations as COM liaison. The Personnel Committee advised the presbytery of the new revised reduced salary packages for the Executive Presbyter, the Administrative Assistant and the Christian Education Consultant. This analysis assumes that the EP and the Administrative Assistant will not work every Friday from June 26 through August 28 (i.e., 10 business days or 2 weeks). The Education Consultant will work 28 hours per week instead of 32 hours per week from June 26 through August 28 (10 weeks). This is the equivalent of not working 40 hours during that time period (i.e., 10 business days or 1.25 weeks). Evaluation sheets were distributed to presbytery regarding the Executive Presbyter's performance. The COM report included a letter from the Stated Clerk of West Jersey Presbytery affirming that they had granted Rev. Paul Milio permission to labor outside the bounds of that presbytery to serve the New Greta congregation for one year as a Temporary Supply Pastor. A one year Stated Supply Minister contract was approved between the Old Tennent Church and Rev. Barbara McDonald. Presbytery acted to allow, if the way be clear, Rev. Kevin Williams to begin work at Martin Luther King, Jr. as a part-time Temporary Supply Pastor. He graduated from Princeton Seminary and was ordained in the American Baptist Church. He wants to become Presbyterian. As the liaison to the MLK, Jr. church I had the privileged to introduce Rev. Williams to the Presbytery and give the prayer. Cynthia Ritter-Parker was examined for ordination and approved, if the way be clear, her call to First Church Englishtown to be their Designated Pastor.

The current outgoing presbytery moderator, Elder Dan Raisch installed the new Moderator, Rev. Dr. Terry Chapman, Forked River, and the new Vice Moderator Elder Sue McPhearson, South Amboy, to their new respective positions each for a one year term.

Presbytery adjourned at a very late hour and the next stated meeting is scheduled for September 22 at Shrewsbury.

Income year-to-date through July 31 is (\$8,594) below our budget, however, expenses are also below budget expectations, so the net result is (\$450), meaning we are close to budget. Nevertheless, as has been the case in previous years, August is a seasonal low in income receipts so we anticipate that by the end of the month, we will need to dip into the Rainy Day Fund to make ends meet. WEBSITE NEWS

Website Changes & New Recording System

Worship services are now recorded by computer and made available on CD instead of cassettes. Computer recording increases sound quality, eliminates gaps in the tapes and speeds up getting services on the website (www.cranburypres.org). Worship Recordings are generally available on the website within two days of the service and on CD in the library by mid-week. Computer scheduling means no missed recordings due to vacations, although that does still delay availability. To get special events recorded, email webmaster@cranburypres.org.

Weekly sermons have been available on the website for about a year. Now the whole service is also available along with the weekly bulletin. You can listen to just the sermon if you prefer. Click on Sermon Archives at the top of any webpage.

There is a new 275th Anniversary News webpage. Click on the 275th Anniversary icon on the banner at the top of page to go to the new page. Clicking on the church picture takes you to the home page. Any additions or changes for the 275th Anniversary News webpage can be sent to webmaster's email address.

There's a new search capability on our website. Look for Search in the top right hand corner of any webpage. If you can use Google, you can use our search feature, because it's actually performed by Google in the background. You could do the same thing with Google with a website specific search, but with our search box, you won't have to tell Google what site to search. One benefit of storing our newsletter and bulletins online is that Google searches them as well as the webpages. If you can't remember where you read an announcement, try the website search. You will get a list of places where your search terms were found on our website. If you position the mouse cursor over the link, you can see where it's found in the status bar without actually going there.

A slide show of pictures from the 2009 Vacation Bible School has been added to the website in both a big and small version. There is also a photo gallery where you can view thumbnails of all pictures. Just click on a photo if you want to see it larger. The slide show and photo gallery are another feature hosted by Google using a church related account. The photo gallery is a private photo album, so the pictures are only available through our website links. For those concerned about security, no names were posted- just lots of smiles!

If anyone has questions or problems with the search feature or anything on the website, just send an email to the webmaster. There is an email link at the bottom of every webpage. That also works for announcements to be posted on the website. We also now have a mailbox in the mailroom across from Fellowship Hall for things that can't be emailed.

WORSHIP NEWS

PRESERVING OUR CHURCH HISTORY

This year of our church's 275th anniversary is an appropriate time to preserve our history as contained in numerous church documents. Although, we have not found any detailed records of our first 10 years, we have a wealth of historical information dating back to 1744 including Records of the Congregation (births, baptisms, ministers, deacons, communicants, marriages, etc). However, during the time of Rev. Smith's pastorate (1762 - 1789), owing to the infirmities of Rev. Smith, there were no regular session meetings, no books of records for communicants, baptisms or deaths. Reverend Snowden (1791 - 1797) searched for records or papers to enable him to recreate a concise history of the church but was unable to do so. It was during Rev. Snowden's pastorate that regular session meetings were held and church records were once again maintained. Many records also show us how important the church was (is) in the community with entries that describe resolving disputes, imposing sanctions for use of "strong language," etc. These records are too important to chance losing or deteriorating for lack of care.

Our documents total just over 9,600 pages of which 1,927 are already on microfilm. Our objective is to microfilm the remaining documents then transfer all to a media format, such as in pdf files (Adobe Reader) that will be available to anyone who wishes access. We also hope to make most, if not all, available on the church website and provide CDs to Cranbury's History Center and Public Library. These records do make some very interesting reading. The original documents will eventually be moved to Princeton Seminary where they have the appropriate storage facilities.

In order to achieve our goal, we need your financial assistance. We received a very generous, and anonymous, pledge of matching the first \$3,000 raised. At this time, our total, without the matching gift, is approximately \$775.
